Prasiolite

Prasiolite (also known as green quartz, green amethyst, or vermarine) is a green variety of quartz.

Since 1950, almost all natural prasiolite has come from a small mine in Brazil, but it has also been mined from Poland.
Naturally occurring prasiolite has also been found in the Thunder Bay area of Canada.



Prasiolite is a rare stone in nature; artificial prasiolite is produced by heat treatment of amethyst. Most amethyst will turn yellow or orange when



heated, producing citrine, but some amethyst will turn green when treated. Currently, almost all prasiolite on the market results from a combination of heat treatment and ionizing radiation.

Green quartz is sometimes incorrectly called green amethyst, which is not an acceptable name for the material according to FTC Guidelines. Other names for green quartz include vermarine and lime citrine.
