I just spent the morning at the dairy going over some of my faceting rough with our resident Gemologist, Carl Lockwood. He brought his equipment over and gave me a quick lesson on how to identify some stones of mine. While obviously not an expert, I now understand the use of a refractometer and a polariscope and how they can be used to benefit me in my faceting.

I buy quite a bit of rough on EBay, with many items coming from China or India. These sellers aren't always truthful in describing their products. So being able to verify the ID of various stones is very important to me. Additionally, I need to know the refractive index of a stone to choose the correct design to use while cutting it.

This session gives me hope in that I have a 73.2 lolite piece on the way (from California) and look forward to verifying the type of rough I bought.



Which leads me to a couple of points. First, we were able to meet at and utilize the dairy workshop while I was there cutting slabs for our cabochon classes. The workshop can be made available for various club functions - remember the picnic? Just touch base with us when you see a need. Secondly, there are some very knowledgeable and talented individuals within our membership who are willing to share what they know to help other members. Sometimes all it takes is to ask.

In closing, I am very appreciative of Carl taking the time to show me what all he did, and I hope you will feel more comfortable in looking for advice and help from your fellow members.



GEMS IN DREAMS

We may say we dream of one day of owning a beautiful gem, but sometimes we literally have dreams involving gems and jewelry while we are asleep.
