ere we go again – Matthews Alive is less than a month away. Vithout a doubt, this is the busiest time of year for the Charlotte Gem and Mineral Club. For newer members who have not participated in this unique event, allow me to explain. Approximately 35 years ago there used to be a modest Labor Day weekend event in Matthews called "The Stumptown Festival" consisting of food vendors, crafts for sale and activities for kids. Today it is called

The Matthews Alive Festival, dedicated to the support of local non-profit organizations and it draws approximately 20,000 people. Over the three day Labor Day weekend there is food, kiddy rides, outdoor entertainment, craft vendors and The Charlotte Gem & Mineral Club.

We have participated continuously in this event for about thirty-five years. We started out as a tent in a field with a few crates of geodes out front and a couple of power saws under the canvas. Purchase a geode and



we will cut it in half for you. Now we occupy three 12 by 12 tents with three power saws, many hundreds of pounds of geodes and a custommade 16 foot sluice. A good portion of the money raised goes towards education in the fields of geology, earth sciences and jewelry making.

You don't have to be a geology genius to work the booth. We need members who can handle money, wrap geodes, instruct kids in how to use the sluice, talk about our



Directions:

From Interstate 77 South: I-77 to I-485 East and follow to Matthews exit. Turn left onto East John Street. Take East John Street to Historic Downtown Matthews.

From Interstate 85 South: Follow I-85 to I-77 South to Brookshire Boulevard East. Follow to the U.S. 74 (Independence Boulevard) exit, and exit left. Take U.S. 74 to Matthews, turning right on Sam Newell Road, and follow across Matthews Township Parkway (N.C. 51) to North Trade Street and Historic Downtown Matthews.

Parking

People with disabilities may use the "horseshoe" parking area located at the side of the Matthews First Baptist Church, off of Sadie Drive. If those spaces are filled, there are handicapped accessible spaces in our Town public parking areas (see below) and at adjoining businesses that are closed during festival hours. Our festival parking attendant can direct you to open spaces.

Free public parking areas are located by the train tracks at North Trade Street and Charles Street. Matthews Station offers parking in front of and behind Town Hall (across from public parking). Parking is also available at many businesses along John and Trade Streets, Matthews Presbyterian Church on John Street and Matthews United Methodist Church on South Trade Street (accessible from Fullwood Lane off N.C. 51)

An Official Field Trip of the Gem and Mineral Society of Franklin, NC (HOST)

Cowee Mountain Ruby Mine Franklin, NC Saturday, August 20, 2016 9am-6pm EST Fee Site (RSVP)

Free food and free area entertainment

Trip/History: Gem mining has been evident in Macon County since 1870. Called corundum, the minerals found commercial value that Tiffany's found interesting. In the 1890's American Prospecting & Mineral Co. and US Ruby Mining Co. worked to find the source. In the early 20th century they left the area and now Franklin's nickname is: The Gem Capital of the World. The source of the minerals has not yet been found. The Cowee Mountain Ruby Mine has been in operation since 1984 and is still under the same ownership today. It is located right off Hwy 441 N. three miles from Franklin, NC.

Collecting: You can find anything from ruby, sapphire, garnets, amethyst, topaz, smoky and rose quartz. The flume is 150 foot long, covered and lighted for your comfort. Food, clean restrooms and water comes with your native bucket, all for \$15. Free parking and pets are welcomed, but must be kept on a leash at all times.

Fees: \$15 per person, children under 12 are free. This fee includes one bucket of natural material, use of 150 foot flume and equipment, food (burgers, dogs, salad, fixings), free entry into the Franklin Gem & Mineral Museum, 25 Phillips

St. from 12 pm until 6 pm, and free local entertainment near the Museum (12th Annual Folk Festival open all day and Pickin on the Square- 6:30 until) bring a chair for the square!

Bring: Old clothes, rubber gloves if you want (water is cold), cushion or old towel to sit on, tennis shoes/boots and a plastic bag for muddy shoes/clothes.

- Keep left to take GA-365 via exit 113 towards Gainesville for 52.7 miles
- Merge onto US-23N/US into Cowee Mtn Ruby Mine

- Take I-85 South towards Gastonia for 70.5 miles
- Merge onto I-26W via exit 70 towards Asheville, NC for 57.8 miles
- Merge onto I-40W/US-74 via exit 32B on left towards Canton/Knoxville 18.3 miles
- Merge onto US-74W via exit 27 towards Clyde/Waynesville/Murphy /Atlanta/Maggie Valley 1.3 miles
- Merge onto US-23S/US-74W for 24.9 miles
- Merge onto US-23/US-441S via exit 81 towards Dillsboro/Franklin/Atlanta for 14.5 miles
- Turn left into Cowee Ruby Mine

An Official Field Trip of the Northeast Georgia Mineral Society (Cornelia, GA) (HOST)

Saturday, September 10, 2016 Clarkesville, GA 10:00 AM Eastern (9 AM Central) Fee: \$10 per person

TRIP: This location is located in a band of kyanite bearing material. The material has been moved around so the kyanite is not in situ, but with a little digging and some perseverance, it has become a fun and productive site.

COLLECTING: Kyanite blades and cobbles, small mica books, and graphite specimens (rare). The kyanite ranges from gray to pale blue and may contain graphite. Some of the blades can be polished and, because of the graphite, they have a curious depth and shimmer when they are polished.

FEE: \$10 per person

BRING: Small blades can be found weathering out onto the surface. Bigger blades and cobbles are found by digging. You will need scratching tools and baggies for surface collecting, and a shovel and pick for digging. <u>All holes must be refilled</u>. This site can be muddy at times, so a change of clothes would be good too.

FACILITIES: There are no facilities at the site, but Northeast Georgia members will have free water and snacks available for everyone.

CHILDREN: This field trip is suitable for children but they must be supervised at all times. PETS: Because this is a working farm, pets are not allowed.

SAFETY: There are electrified fences on the farm so <u>do not</u> touch any fences. Field trip leads will open and close gates. This is a working farm and there may be animals present – <u>do not</u> approach any of the animals. <u>Do not</u> enter pastures where animals are present.
