THE PREZ SAYZ

he Charlotte Gem and Mineral Club is about to end a very long-standing relationship with an old friend . . . a relationship that started over forty years ago.

n the early 1970s the club was actively involved in putting together and running an annual gem and mineral show. One of the requirements for such an event was display cabinets for exhibits such as members' collections, unique items on loan from dealers or institutions, etc. At that time appropriate cabinets that could be locked and had good internal lighting were not readily available from rental companies. The club





had to buy custom made units. After doing so, a new problem evolved – where to store them after the show. Club members' basements and garages did not work out very well and self-storage warehouses had not been invented yet, so a decision was made to purchase a trailer to be used as storage.

In 1974 a 38-foot trailer (manufactured in 1959) was purchased for \$1500. In those days one of the most popular venues for shows and exhibits in Charlotte was the Merchandise Mart (currently called The Park) on Independence Boulevard. Exhibitors were allowed to park storage trailers in a field adjacent to the building. Our trailer remained at that site for a number of years until a decision was made to upgrade the Merchandise Mart and the land around it. This led to another problem. In 1984 the club was ordered to move the trailer but

ROCK OF THE MONTH PSILOMELANE

Psilomelane, erroneously, and uncommonly known as black hematite (but not related to true hematite, which is an iron ore), is a group name for hard black manganese oxides such as hollandite and romanechite. Psilomelane consists of hydrous manganese oxide with variable amounts of barium and potassium.

Formula

Generalized formula may be represented as Ba(Mn2+) (Mn4+)8O16(OH)4 or as (Ba,H2O)2Mn5O10. It is sometimes considered to be a hydrous



manganese manganate, but of

doubtful composition. The amount of manganese present corresponds to 70-80% of manganous oxide with 10-15% of available oxygen.

Characteristics

Psilomelane is amorphous and occurs as botryoidal and stalactitic masses with a smooth shining surface and submetallic lustre. The mineral is readily distinguished from other hydrous manganese oxides (manganite and wad) by its greater hardness 5 to 6; the specific gravity varies from 3.7 to 4.7. The streak is brownish black and the fracture smooth. Owing to its amorphous nature, the mineral often contains admixed impurities, such as iron hydroxides. It is soluble in hydrochloric acid with evolution of chlorine gas.

History and occurrence

The name has reference to this characteristic appearance, from the Greek for (naked, smooth) and (black); a Latinized form is calvonigrite, and a German name with the same meaning is Schwarzer Glaskopf.

It is a common and important ore of manganese, occurring under the same conditions and having the same commercial applications as pyrolusite. It is found at many localities; amongst those which have yielded typical botryoidal specimens may be mentioned the Restormel iron mine at Lostwithiel in Cornwall, Brendon Hills in Somerset, Hoy in Orkney, Sayn near Coblenz, and Crimora in Augusta county, Virginia. With pyrolusite it is extensively mined in Vermont, Virginia, Arkansas, and Nova
